Every year, the Malongs celebrate Kyle's birthday with a party. Last September 24 was no exception but the family made it more special. The mother talked to her son about the possibility of giving up his birthday presents and instead, asked guests to buy the MHHS lottery tickets.

Jet said, "All my friends and relatives were told not to buy any gifts and just buy tickets. We explained it in the invitation."

The family residence in Surrey was made up for the celebration with an assortment of Oriental and Western food and delicacies and party balloons sans the traditional birthday gifts.

Jet said, "Since Kyle is the youngest and he likes to have a party, we indulge him." The family also prepared a special giveaway of canned homemade salmon for each ticket purchaser.

Kyle said he is happy to be part of the MHHS fundraising activity. The eight grader said, "I don't need much anyway. All I need probably are clothes but my parents can always buy me that."

MHHS Panelist in BC-wide Hate Crime Symposium

THE Multicultural Helping House Society (MHHS) participated as a panelist in a recent province-wide symposium addressing hate crimes in British Columbia, bringing to the table its experience in working with youth immigrants.

With the help of facilitators and artists, the youth wrote their own script and performed it using modern and indigenous art forms like rap, hiphop, martial arts, tribal dance, drumming, and chanting. The program culminated in an innovative interdisciplinary theatrical performance which was received enthusiastically by youth and adults alike at the Vancouver East Cultural Centre.

Mr. Guerrero said COLOURBLIND expressed the experiences of these young immigrants and their struggles to blend with the Canadian community.

Service providers from all over BC including Chilliwack, Penticton and Victoria expressed interest in the COLOURBLIND experience as youth in these places experience similar challenges. Guerrero stated that DVD copies of COLOURBLIND will soon be made available to agencies and schools.

The symposium was organized by the BC government, Justice Institute, RCMP E Division, BC Hate Crime Team, and the BC Crime Prevention Association. It was held at

Success Story: Newcomer Engineer hired as Engineer with help of Bamboo Network

What's the fuss if an immigrant engineer lands a job moping floors? Immigrant doctors and accountants work in assembly lines, too. Isn't that usual when immigrants leave jobs from their home country or overseas and come to Canada?

Dondi Elvambuena, a Filipino electrical engineer with more than 10 years experience in power technology in the Middle East, arrived in Canada two years ago together with his family. Knowing that he has the education and years of technical experience, he eagerly applied for jobs in his profession. However, for one and a half year, Dondi took odd jobs one after another.

Last March 2005, Dondi signed up with the Bamboo Network Host Mentoring Program of the Multicultural Helping House Society and made a strategic change in his job search. The MHHS connected him with a group of immigrant and professional engineers who were graduates of MAPUA, one of the best engineering schools in the Philippines, and officers of the school's alumni association based in BC. The networking opportunity connected Dondi with his mentor, Dexter Tarampi who is also a MHHS Board of Director and a Maintenance Program Engineer at BC Hydro.

Mentors are professionals who volunteer with the MHHS Bamboo Network to provide information, support and guidance to newcomers and immigrants who want to get back on track in their profession. Some of the support that mentors provide include information about job openings, people to contact for jobs, and coaching for job interviews. As mentee, a newcomer or immigrant in professions and trades, plans and acts to achieve his/her career goals.

Today, just like his mentor, Dondi works at BC Hydro having been recently hired as a Consultant in the BC Hydro Edmonds, Burnaby office. Dondi has a lot of insights about his experience; he says that "if you put something in paper (your resume), be sure to deliver". For Dondi, the much-needed opportunity through the Bamboo Network, "not loosing hope, gearing up for the highly competitive Canadian culture, and lots of prayers" worked well in helping him get his job at BC Hydro.

Bamboo Network mentors and mentees come from over 27 occupational groups and diverse cultural backgrounds. Strategic Planning Session in Burnaby

A slight drizzle failed to dampen the jovial mood during the MHHS strategic planning session in Burnaby Lake Pavilion last October 2.

In attendance were thirty-one MHHS board of directors, staff, volunteers, partner service providers and representatives from the Filipino and South Asian community. Amid potluck lunch, they assessed the Society's performance for the past three years and identified problem areas and opportunities. These served as inputs for the day's other agenda to formulate MHHS medium-term goals and an action plan.

MHHS President Tom Avendano welcomed the participants and thanked them for their time and continuing commitment to MHHS. MHHS Executive Director Eleanor Guerrero-Campbell gave an overview of MHHS and noted that it has improved significantly in the three areas of credible service, financial standing and organizational strength. Ms. Shyla Dutt, diversity consultant, facilitated the day.

Ms. Guerrero-Campbell said MHHS continues to experience increasing number of clients from different cultural backgrounds and age. Participants were colour-coded into seven groups and ranked communications as top priority for the future. Among the recommendations were to improve the website and get volunteer translators. The recommendations will be considered by the MHHS Board in preparing its strategic plan for 2006-2008/10.
